


# Foreword



I'm pleased to share the first SSEN Transmission Community Benefit Fund Annual Review. Our commitment is clear: to drive investment in the energy transition in a way that delivers lasting benefits for communities and the wider economy.

Our £22bn+ investment in the electricity network by 2031 is essential for securing clean, affordable power. This investment also creates jobs, builds skills, and supports local supply chains. Through our community funds, we go further—providing direct financial support for community projects that make a real difference at a regional, and a local level.


This year marks a significant milestone for our Regional Community Benefit Fund. We've awarded our first £2m to projects that will make a real difference across the North of Scotland. The response from communities has been outstanding, with nearly 330 proposals submitted, collectively requesting over £50m in funding—clear evidence of ambition and innovation across our network area.

Our independent decision-making panel, Chaired by Peter Peacock, has selected ten projects that will deliver the greatest impact across our priority areas. These initiatives show how strategic support can strengthen communities, nurture talent, preserve heritage, and reduce energy poverty. Alongside this, our first Local Fund has provided £252,000 to projects across the Central and Eastern Scotland, and we look forward to developing many more local funds shaped by community priorities. We will collaborate with local communities and partners to identify priorities and deliver a coordinated approach that supports local areas in achieving their objectives.

Looking ahead, our Pathway to 2030 investment programme will enable us to deliver over £100m in community benefit. This is about more than infrastructure—it's about creating thriving, resilient communities and leaving a lasting social and economic legacy.

Thank you to every community group, stakeholder, and partner whose ideas and commitment make this programme possible. Your collaboration and determination are central to achieving our shared ambition and delivering lasting benefits for communities. Together, we can continue to build resilience, create opportunities, and ensure that this investment leaves a positive legacy for generations to come.

**Independent decision making** – open recruitment and expert training to ensure decisions are made by diverse panels of local people, for local communities.




**Flexibility** - adopting a flexible approach that is responsive and adapts to changing needs, in a way that is proportionate to scale and impact.



**Good governance** – maintaining high ethical standards and accountability. Our governance practices are designed to be flexible, build trust and ensure inclusivity.



**Maximising impact** – using proportionate approaches to deliver maximum, positive impact which is measurable and sustainable.



Based on the outcomes of our 2023 public consultation on community benefit, two different types of funds have been developed. A strategic regional fund and multiple local funds will ensure the funding can deliver maximum value across the SSEN Transmission network area while also meeting the needs of the local communities closest to our new infrastructure.



**Regional Fund** – established to support strategic not for profit projects which create a significant, transformational and long-lasting legacy for communities across the north of Scotland.



**Local Funds** – established to support communities situated close to new transmission infrastructure, empowering communities to develop and enhance services, assets and local activities. Each fund is unique, focusing on the priorities of the local community to ensure maximum impact in the local area.

#### **Priorities for 2025/26**

Moving into 2025/26, we will continue to deliver on our initial £10m community benefit commitment, through both the Regional Fund, and the Eastern Green Link 2, Shetland HVDC and Argyll and Kintyre 275kV Local Funds.

In addition, we welcomed the publication in March 2025 of the UK Government Guidance on Community Funds for Transmission Infrastructure, which will allow us to further expand and grow our community benefit offering.





#### Independent decision making

#### **Sharing value**

SSEN Transmission has created the Regional Fund as part of our community benefit commitment from our planned at least £22bn investment in the transmission network by 2031. The fund is open to not-for-profit projects which support communities in the north of Scotland network area. The fund focusses on supporting significant and transformational impact beyond more than one community.

#### Lasting legacy priorities

The priorities of the fund were developed through an extensive consultation process in 2023 where community groups, stakeholders and residents were asked to identify the key issues in the region and analysis was conducted with local area needs assessments and regional community planning reports. The focus of the consultation was to identify the priorities which needed investment to make a lasting legacy to local communities.

#### The three priorities are:

**People:** Supporting projects that help people develop new skills, access training, and find employment pathways. By removing barriers, we aim to create more opportunities for people across the north of Scotland.

**Place:** Investing in projects that preserve important spaces, celebrate cultural heritage, and promote local traditions – from restoring heritage sites to supporting language and music initiatives.

**Fuel Poverty:** With rising energy costs continuing to impact households across the region, seeking to find strategic ways to alleviate fuel poverty across the north of Scotland.



Founded in 1986, Fèis Rois aims to provide opportunities for people of all ages to access, participate in and enjoy Scottish traditional music and Gaelic cultural activities. Over the years, they have shown the importance of their project across Ross-shire and beyond, with participants increasing both their confidence, skills and knowledge of traditional music and culture. Fèis Rois also provide a vital ladder of progression, supporting young musicians to reach their full potential and become industry professionals.

The Fèis Rois programme is a well-embedded existing offer within the community, but unfortunately, due to an increase in programme costs, additional funding was needed to continue. SSEN Transmission were able to provide the necessary additional funding to support the project until 2028. This includes supporting their Easter tuition week, regular weekly classes, Ceilidh Trail sessions and the October residence. These sessions support young people from their very first engagement with traditional music and Scottish culture, all the way through to potentially becoming a professional musician.

Over the course of the three years, this funding will enable Fèis Rois to engage with a minimum of 675 children and young people through music workshops and events, as well as supporting a minimum of 30 young musicians through the Ceilidh Trail programme. This funding will allow Fèis Rois to continue to provide their important programmes and continue to engage young people with Scottish culture and music.

"The funding is fantastic news for Fèis Rois, coming after a period of uncertainty, and will provide much needed support to ensure that the next generation of young musicians continue to benefit from our traditional music and arts events. Scottish labour forecasting suggests that North East Scotland could need thousands of additional workers over the coming years for major projects, including those that contribute to the country's net zero goals.

The Energy Transition Skills Hub, opened by First Minister John Swinney in September 2025, is designed to be Scotland's first dedicated facility to support these specific training needs, aiming to build capacity and expertise to support future workforce security.


The Skills Hub will provide local people with pathways and opportunities to train, upskill or reskill in order to access work within growth sectors. The Skills Hub has been shaped by industry requirements, with specific zones and equipment being used to deliver technical and skills-based training for roles in construction and operation of a variety of energy-related developments. The £150,000 award from the SSEN Transmission Regional Fund will be utilised to purchase the cutting-edge equipment needed to train the participants.

The Skills Hub is expected to enrol up to 2,500 individuals in the first four years of their operation, supporting 1,000 people into related jobs – a much-needed support for the energy transition.

Fuel poverty levels across Orkney are among the highest in the UK, due to the harsh climate conditions and inefficient housing stock. Fuel-poor households, often in properties with low energy efficiency, face difficulties in accessing the necessary resources for efficiency updates, particularly in the outer isles, where logistics and access to contractors is especially challenging.


With this funding from the Regional Fund, THAW Orkney are aiming to help tackle this issue by providing specific support for properties across the outer isles. This project will involve 'clustering' energy efficiency and retrofit works, so that resources can be used more effectively. Supporting a minimum of 40 of the hardest to reach properties, this project will fund key repair and installation works, which are not covered by other national grants. The funding will also secure the employment of the three core staff needed to lead the project to ensure robust retrofit design, co-ordination and advice.

This innovative approach will ensure that over 40 households move out of fuel poverty with the long-lasting energy efficiency measures providing families with improved living conditions, lower energy bills and reduced carbon utilisation. Lessons learnt from this project will be used in other remote areas of Scotland.

"THAW has been focussing our work on tackling one of the root causes of fuel poverty in Orkney, namely the high levels of disrepair and resulting energy inefficiency of local properties, particularly on ferry-linked isles. The funding from SSEN Transmission will allow THAW and partners on the isles to pilot a new repair, upgrade and replace pathway designed to support those in most need of support."



### East Coast 400kV Overhead Line Upgrade

A review was conducted of all regional, local authority and community plans across the east coast area, which was then followed by a consultation with key community stakeholders. During this process, health and wellbeing was identified as a priority across the whole beneficiary area. This existing line connects Kintore in Aberdeenshire through Angus and Perth to our network boundary in Clackmannanshire.

We are delighted that the East Coast Local Community Benefit Fund has enabled a wide range of health and wellbeing projects, delivering meaningful change in local communities.


#### Creating local positive impact

The first local fund was provided in 2025 and supported the communities near the East Coast 400kV Overhead Line Upgrade. The East Coast Fund was a one-off fund, aimed at supporting not for profit projects across Aberdeenshire, Angus, Perth and Kinross, and Clackmannanshire.

#### Local decision making

The decisions on who should receive funding from the East Coast Fund was made by an independent panel made up of community representatives from across the beneficiary area, identified through an open recruitment process. The panel participated in a range of training sessions to ensure informed decision making, with a focus on the fit with the fund priorities and proximity to the beneficiary area.

Having access to a range of sport and leisure facilities is pivotal to many communities' well-being strategies. Across Scotland it has been recognised that there is a shortage of inclusive sports opportunities. Perth & Kinross Disability Sport is committed to supporting local people with disabilities to get active and access sport. A key part of the charity's growth plans is expanding the range of wheelchair sports they can offer. The award from SSEN Transmission has helped them to purchase new specialist equipment including a sports wheelchair, basketball hoops, badminton racquets and boccia sets. The funding will also be used to support the cost of facilities hire, allowing them to expand the range and frequency of their sessions across Perth & Kinross.

The award will also support the capacity growth of other local sports clubs as Perth & Kinross Disability Sport will host sessions with coaches from other local sports clubs, providing them with the opportunity to work with athletes with disabilities, improving their own coaching techniques and encouraging them to be more inclusive in their own club environment.


The project will benefit over 100 people and for many participants this can be the first step into being able to access local, regional and national sporting pathways.

Community gardens can be a key local service to improve the health and well-being of local residents. They have been shown to provide significant improvements in social cohesion and help to increase the supply of local, fresh food. The community of Bridge of Earn have developed an ambitious project to create a community growing space on Moncreiffe Hill. The Growspace Creations project aims to connect the community with nature and help residents learn new skills relating to growing their own food and flowers.

The investment from the East Coast Fund has enabled the local vision to become a reality, by funding the purchase of the critical infrastructure needed to develop the site including a polytunnel, planting materials and a compost toilet for visitors and volunteers. This will enable the development of the growing space and enable ongoing sustainable food growing, wellness activities and community connection.

Working with other local community groups, Growspace Creations aim to make the new site a key community space, reaching up to 500 people. Community members will be able to meet others and socialise, pick their own food and flowers, and attend free sessions on practical topics such as permaculture, food preservation and seed saving.

"It's such an amazing feeling to receive this support, especially as we only launched Growspace Creations CIC earlier this year. The funding has helped us build a polytunnel and buy plants and compost, helping create a welcoming, beautiful space where people can connect with nature, spend time together, and enjoy growing things.

Our long-term vision is to build a wider food-growing and mental wellbeing network, and we hope this is the first of many spaces where we can create lasting impact through connection and care."

Community woodlands are a vital element of many rural communities. They provide a diverse range of benefits for both nature preservation and community well-being. In 2003 a community woodland, Westmuir Community Woodland Park, was upgraded to be an accessible area through the installation of a network of raised boardwalk paths, not only to be wheelchair and pushchair accessible, but also to protect the unique wet heath areas and its diverse wildlife. The area is now recognised by Angus Council as a Local Nature Conservation Site.

Local volunteers developed an ambitious maintenance plan which provides site improvements after 20 years of community use and enhances the asset for future generations. The SSEN Transmission funding is being used to upgrade the signage across the community woodland and complete necessary tree maintenance. The funds are also being used to purchase a picnic table and bench for the wildflower meadow. Demonstrating the continued commitment to accessibility the new provision has adapted access to ensure use for wheelchair users.

The woodland is well used by the community, including hosting local walking and rambling groups, as well as attracting visitors to the region. These necessary upgrades will allow the woodland to continue to be enjoyed for years to come.

Dementia can affect every aspect of a person's life. It can impact their physical, mental, emotional, and social well-being. Specialist community support for both those living with a dementia diagnosis and their careers can be vital to well-being. Based in Banchory, Forget-Me-Not Club is a vital service for local families, and to ensure they continue to meet local needs, they developed a project to expand their group activity offering by introducing chair yoga.

Chair yoga supports physical health through focussing on flexibility, strength, balance and mobility – all of which reduces the risk of falls. In addition, these exercises provide an opportunity for people to focus on their breathing and posture, which can help reduce the anxiety and agitation that many people with dementia experience. As these are held as group sessions, they also offer an opportunity for social inclusion, encouraging participants to engage with others and share memories.

The funding from the East Coast Local Fund has contributed towards the running of three chair yoga sessions each week over the course of a year, reaching a minimum of 34 people per week. These sessions are run as respite sessions, meaning that families and carers also benefit, as they can use this time as a chance to recharge their batteries.

With the cost-of-living crisis, increase in food costs, and more people living in food insecurity, it is increasingly important for people to be able to understand how to cook budget-friendly healthy food for themselves and their families.

Based in Inverurie, Garioch Community Kitchen provide cookery classes for both children and adults, focussing on making affordable healthy food. These cookery courses are designed to equip attendees with the skills, confidence and ability to cook for themselves, providing practical experience as well as theory. The classes cover meal planning, how to budget, how to avoid food waste, and using leftovers, giving them the skills they need to be able to cook affordable and healthy food at home. Everyone attending also goes home with a hot meal to feed the whole family.

The East Coast Grant award will provide funding to host ten children's cookery classes and eight adult classes. The classes will primarily focus on making budget friendly recipes, and how to make these meals go further. It is expected that 180 people will directly benefit by attending these classes, with an estimated 320 additional people benefiting from the hot meal that is taken home.

The classes are fun and interactive and can make a fundamental difference to a families' lives by sharing the necessary skills to make healthy and affordable food.
