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## APPENDIX 10.2: DESIGNATED HERITAGE ASSETS IN THE OUTER STUDY AREA

This appendix provides details on the designated heritage assets recorded within the Outer Study Area together with their designation type and heritage sensitivity.

The appendix should be read in conjunction with Chapter 10: Cultural Heritage and Archaeology, Section 10.11: Baseline Conditions and Section 10.13: Assessment of Effects.

The locations and extents of the recorded heritage assets within the Outer Study Area are shown on Figure 10.2a-c Cultural Heritage: Outer Study Area.

SM4968	Cairn o'Mount, cairns	Scheduled Monument	High	Remains of two burial cairns dated to the late Neolithic or early Bronze Age.  The better-preserved cairn measures 15.5 m in diameter and 3.5 m in height while the second cairn, located approximately 50 m to the east south-east, is 10 m in diameter and 0.3 m in height but has been damaged by quarrying.  The cairns are located in a prominent topographic position on high ground alongside B974, Fettercairn to Banchory road. From the cairns, there are wide views in all directions and in particular, long-range views to the south and southeast, looking down onto the Howe of Mearns.  The setting makes a high contribution to appreciation of the character of the monument and to understanding its function; it was evidently sited deliberately to command views over the Howe of Mearns and to be seen from that lower landscape.	0.9	Negligible The Proposed Development will be seen passing the monument on its north side, visible running from the west to the northeast, the nearest proposed pole being around 800 m to the northeast of the monument.  A photomontage of the view of the Proposed Development from the cairn (Volume 3: Figure 3.2.1a-b: VL1 - Cairn o`Mount) shows that the proposed poles would be visible crossing moorland immediately surrounding the burial cairns, largely screened by intervening topography and backclothed by surrounding hills.  Although the Proposed Development would represent a modern addition to long-distance views to the north of the scheduled monument, it would not represent a noticeable change to the wider landscape surroundings.  Key views from the monument to the south and southeast, out over the Howe of Mearns and to the coast will be unaffected.	Negligible The Proposed Development would not represent a noticeable change to the wider landscape surroundings of the asset. The Proposed Development will not hinder the ability of any visitor to appreciate the character of the monument or to appreciate and understand its relationship with its wider landscape. LB9311	Brawliemuir Farmhouse	Category C Listed Building	Low	The remains of a two-storey farmhouse. Agricultural outbuildings lie to the northwest of the farmhouse. The farmhouse is located on the southern slopes of Leachie Hill. The farmhouse lies just east of a number of modern farm barns and adjacent to a block of mature woodland, which provides a sheltered setting for the farmhouse. Views to the surrounding immediate landscape are afforded from the farmhouse to the south. Localised farmland setting.	0.3	Negligible The Proposed Development will be seen passing the Listed Building on its north side, visible running from the southwest to the northeast, the nearest proposed pole being around 300 m to the north of the Listed Building.  Modern farm barns and mature woodland that surround the buildings would largely, if not completely, screen views of the Proposed Development from the Listed Building.	Negligible Visibility of the Proposed Development from the farmhouse would be largely screened by intervening buildings and mature woodland. Although the Proposed Development would be a modern element in the surrounding landscape, the localised farmland setting of the farmhouse would not be compromised.	-
