## **APPENDIX V2-11.2: SOCIO-ECONOMIC BASELINE**

#### 11.1 Introduction

11.1.1 This Appendix sets out a regional economic audit of the Highland Council local authority area. It is based on a review of available statistics to present an overview of regional economic condition and covers population, economic activity and inactivity, employment and unemployment, worklessness and inactivity, employment sectors, education attainment, and earnings. A particular focus has been placed on the tourism sector following feedback received from the Highland Council (THC) at the Scoping stage.

## 11.2 Population

11.2.1 The Highland Council area has a population of over 235,000 residents and has witnessed an increase of 2.0 % over the period 2010 to 2020 - compared to 3.9 % increase at the Scottish level and an 6.9 % rise at the national (Great Britain) level. The area has witnessed a population increasing at a slower rate than the Scottish and the Great Britain (GB) rates.

11.2.2 In terms of the working age population, 60.7 % of the regional population is of working age, compared to 63.9 % and 62.4 % at the Scottish and GB levels respectively. This indicates that the area has a lower proportion of people of working age, which can be seen to be an economic challenge in terms of securing future economic prosperity.

### 11.3 Economic Activity

11.3.1 Table 1-3 below highlights that the Highlands has a higher proportion of working age people who are economically active, when compared to the Scottish and GB levels. The level of economic activity is higher regionally than nationally for both males and females. The regional area also has a higher proportion of self-employed people than recorded nationally.

11.3.2 This suggests that although the region has fewer people of working age, those who are of working age are more economically active than recorded nationally and at the GB level. This is an economic strength and one which can help secure future economic wealth. A more detailed assessment of unemployment is set out later in this appendix.

### 11.4 Economic Inactivity

11.4.1 The corollary to higher economic activity rates is that the Highlands has a lower rate of economic inactivity, as shown in **Table 1-4** below.

11.4.2 It is worth noting that of those economically inactive, the region has a higher proportion of people who 'want a job' (18.5 %) compared to the Scottish (17.6 %) level. This suggests there is more of a desire to find work in the Highlands than recorded nationally.

#### 11.5 Workless households

11.5.1 In terms of worklessness, there are fewer households in the region, compared to the Scottish level, that are workless households. However, the rate is slightly higher than the GB rate.

#### 11.6 Claimant Count Unemployment

11.6.1 The latest claimant count unemployment rate highlights that although the region has a lower rate than the Scottish rate, the unemployment rate is also below the GB average.

- 11.6.2 Although regional unemployment is below the national unemployment rate, regional unemployment has increased from 2.6 % in March 2020 to 3.0 % in March 2022, this represents an increase of 15.8 % in the number of people out of work and claiming benefits over the last two years. It was as high as 5.9 % in July 2020 as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- 11.6.3 In terms of unemployment by age range, the regional position is better than the Scottish situations across all age ranges.

11.6.4 In terms of benefit claimants by type, the area has a lower rate of job seeker allowance claimants and lone parent claimants. However, it has a slightly higher proportion of disabled and bereaved claimants.

11.6.5 Overall, in terms of 'main out of work benefits' the Highlands has a lower proportion of claimant than recorded at the Scottish and GB levels.

# 11.7 Employment by Occupation

11.7.1 **Table 1-9** highlights the type of employment at the Highlands, Scottish and GB levels. It indicates that the region has a higher proportion of skilled trade, caring, leisure and service, and process plant and machine operatives, than the Scottish and GB levels.

11.7.2 Regionally there are fewer people employed in professional, associate professional, technical, sales and customer service occupations and elementary occupations (such as cleaners, labourers and food preparation assistants).

#### 11.8 Jobs

- 11.8.1 The region has a lower proportion of full-time jobs and more part-time jobs than the Scottish and GB levels.
- 11.8.2 In terms of industry of employment, the Highlands have higher rates of water supply related posts, construction jobs, wholesale and retail trade, accommodation and food service occupations, education, health and social work jobs and arts, entertainment and recreation posts. The construction sector is well represented at the Highlands level, suggesting the local area is well positioned to benefit from aspects of the Proposed Development, as shown in **Table 1-10** below.

11.8.3 The region has a lower proportion of mining and quarrying roles, manufacturing employment, Information Technology and Communications (ITC) roles, financial service posts, professional services and public administrative related jobs. The manufacturing sector is underrepresented which may affect the region's ability to benefit from the Proposed Development.

### 11.9 Businesses

11.9.1 In terms of the business base, the Highlands has a higher proportion of micro enterprise and smaller business units (in terms of employment numbers) than witnessed at the national (Scottish) level. The incidence of larger businesses is lower in the regional level than recorded nationally as shown in **Table 1-11**.
